## PAPO President's Report (August 2019-July 2020)

The 2019-2020 was as we all know a year of two halves! Since there was a good chunk of 6 weeks where no events were able to happen, one might have thought the total number of PAPO events was down this year. However, you would be mistaken, in the previous twelve months PAPO has held 29 events when compared with the 26 we held last year. The calendar for 2020 has been based around a different looking OY series, with the aim of finding the best all round Orienteer. Covid-19 has forced the competition and rules to be revisited but we will continue for at least the rest of this year in this format as a trial. Feedback so far has largely been positive, so thanks go to Alan and Iona for instigating this idea.

PAPO has been fairly resilient to the challenges presented by Covid-19. However, one major issue we are facing is the availability of charitable grants. Typically, we rely on Funding Grants to help pay for Map's and Equipment, and maintain a good financial base for a "rainy day". This year it has been raining quite a bit and means that we have had to dip into our cash reserves to keep creating maps and opportunities to play our sport with a view to Oceania.

Oceania was scheduled for January 2021, however given the events of the last two months in Victoria and now Auckland, the Oceania organizing committee has recommended that in consultation with PAPO, that we seek to push the Oceania Champs out until January 2022. The decision at this stage is with ONZ, OA and the IOF. Whatever the final decision is, it is highly unlikely Oceania will go ahead next

year. PAPO has suggested that we will hold some local events in the absence, but this is in the very early discussion stages at this point.

So the last 12 months has actually been quite busy and although it may not look like it on the outside, there has been a lot going on in the background and behind the scenes. I am proud to be part of a club that (even despite differences of opinions) we all work well together to make sure that PAPO is functioning well and full of enthusiasm for the future.

### **National Champs**

In the 12 months to now there has not been the National Champs yet... These have been postponed (at this stage) until Labour Weekend. The traditional Easter National Champs ended up in the middle of lockdown so with a 4 day staycation instore, Club Captain Briana stepped up to the plate and provided a fantastic set of Orienteering related challenges to keep us all busy! We probably don't need to let everyone know who was the ultimate winner of the 4 day competition was, do we??

Again Sport Canterbury has been telling us we are doing a good job – Quote from report: "Orienteering has a good product proposition; it is a year around sport, available to the whole family and very affordable."

#### Committee and Non-Committee officers
